HC: Return original certs of student

Hyderabad: The Telangana high court on Tuesday directed Malla Reddy Engineering College (Autonomous) at Maisammaguda to return a student's original educational certificates without insisting on payment of four years' tuition fees. Justice K Lakshman passed the order in response to a petition filed by Namile Sanjay Kumar.

Kumar approached the HC after the college allegedly withheld his original documents, demanding full course fees as a precondition for return, his counsel Mohammad Fayaz said.

Fayaz argued that college's action was illegal and a violation of student's fundamental rights under Articles 14, 21, and 300-A of the Constitution.

"It is contrary to regulations by the UGC, AICTE and Telangana Council of Higher Education, which prohibit educational institutions from retaining students' original documents," he contended. The court ordered the college to return the certificates without demanding pending fees. The court named the govt, director of technical education, and the Registrar of JNTU-Hyderabad as respondents in the case, TNN

The Telangana High Court has directed Malla Engineering Reddy College (Autonomous), Maisammaguda, return a student's original educational certificates without insisting on payment of the full course fee.
